Have you ever wondered why is it that one presidential candidate can win the popular vote but another wins the electoral vote, and thus, the presidency?

It's because that's how the framers of the Constitution set it up. This system of electing presidents is a big reason why President Donald Trump won the election in 2016. Four candidates in history have won a majority of the popular vote only to be denied the presidency by the Electoral College. That includes Hillary Clinton, who had the largest popular vote margin of any losing presidential candidate in U.S. history.

The Electoral College was devised at the Constitutional Convention in 1787. It was a compromise between those who wanted direct popular elections for president and those who preferred to have Congress decide. At a time of little national identity and competition among the states, there were concerns that people would favor their regional candidates and that big states with denser populations would dominate the vote.

The Electoral College has 538 members, with the number allocated to each state, based on how many representatives it has in the House, plus its two senators. (The District of Columbia gets three, despite the fact that the home to Congress has no vote in Congress.)To be elected president, the winner must get at least half plus one — or 270 electoral votes.

# October Annual Enrollment Report,

## Presented at the October 26 School Board Meeting

#### **Overall K-12 Enrollment**

The decline from 2019 to 2020 is most heavily impacted at kindergarten, as a larger portion of kindergarten students did not enroll. The numbers in elementary had a more significant decline and the secondary numbers are partially explained by attrition and generally positive gains at 6<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grade.

Homeschool increases explain some of the loss. Private and charter school enrollments do not seem to impact the decline. There is an increase in students who have withdrawn that the District has no information about where they went and why they left.



#### New Covid-19 Data Examination Team

A group of stakeholders representing several different segments of the District had their first meeting on Thursday, 11/5. This group has the task of evaluating data sets available from the County, State, and possibly other sources in order to determine which sets should be considered as the most valid for making District decisions. Participating in the group are various levels of District administration, parents, school board members, community members, county and state heath officials, Val Holthus, AHEM President, and Verna Wong, AHEM member and Anoka Hennepin Teachers of Color Coalition Co-Chair.

## The Families First Coronavirus Response Act

Expires on December 31 establishes two separate and temporary paid leave laws, which run from April 1 – Dec. 31: the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act and the Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act. These laws provide emergency paid sick leave and some partially paid parental leave protections to eligible employees who need to provide care to their children because of school and child care closures.
