



The tentative agreement will be presented to the board on Monday, November 22 for their approval. The district goal is to have changes in salary and retro pay reflected on the December 17 pay period.

Immense gratitude goes to the Negotiations team for many, many hours spent

over the summer preparing, and for time spent in meetings with the district that continued into the school year. For every hour spent meeting with the District, twice as many were spent preparing, examining language, and comparing salary schedules. Many a sleepless night was experienced during this round of negotiations. AHEM members will enjoy many language pieces of the contract for years to come particularly when they retire and see a greater amount contributed to their 403b, and the value of more days put toward health insurance premiums. Teachers in their early years will enjoy advancing to the higher pay levels much faster and earn considerably more over their careers.

The Negotiations Team thanks everyone for their support and is already thinking ahead to the next round of bargaining.

Meet and Confer Follow-up

Another topic of last week's Meet and Confer was the importance of World Language.

Learning a second language has far-reaching benefits including critical thinking skills, creativity and advantages for future employability.

Hannah Ames, French and English teacher at Coon Rapids High School, reported to the Board at Meet and Confer last week, "Even if students have limited linguistic proficiency, world language instruction sets them up for successful interactions with others in personal and professional arenas, locally and globally. We lay the groundwork for skills that are attractive to employers and can provide opportunities for students that otherwise would be closed to them."

The world language issue Hannah and also Caitlin Beutel (Anoka HS) raised last week at Meet and Confer is Anoka-Hennepin's approach taken to meet the needs of their world language students.

Assuming cost-containment is always a significant consideration, Anoka-Hennepin Dist. 11 inappropriately schedules foreign language classes in a way that causes students to potentially miss a year of instruction and valuable exposure and practice. Additionally, students are placed together in the same classroom, regardless of whether they are in their first, second and even third year of their foreign language experience. The issue with combined courses is that language takes time to build and it is impossible to create an immersion style environment for students when one group is an entire year (or 2 or 3) behind the other. It becomes obvious that when this inappropriate grouping takes place, early students can become overwhelmed, while experienced students may not receive a language experience as advanced as they deserve. Both groups are dissatisfied and could potentially give up on learning a foreign language.

The solutions provided to the Board included: 1. honoring prerequisites, 2. Offer courses in a wrap-around model, allowing students to take their language throughout the year, and 3. reducing the maximum number of students (currently 40). Because we know preparing students for success is an important goal of ours as educators, and providing a quality language experience promotes a broader view of the world, we believe Anoka-Hennepin should offer students the highest standard possible.

Foreign language study promotes understanding and empathy like no other course could. The enriching learning experience of culture and society **builds good citizenship** and helps form relationships.

"At a time in our country when social and political division is higher than ever, the ability to understand others is arguably one of the most important skills a student

could bring into their future careers and personal lives." (Katherine Stark, Center for Language Teaching Advancement, Michigan State University, 2019)
