STOP THE MADNESS!

On Tuesday a shooting at Robb Elementary School in Texas tragically targeted children, an unimaginable loss for the parents, the staff and the community. Every day, our country loses people to gun violence. This must stop, and we must act. These mass shootings are a stark reminder of why the Senate must stop hiding behind arcane procedures to avoid preventing gun violence and take action. A bi-partisan bill in the House has sat for a year without the Senate's action. We must create laws that stop these preventable deaths. It could happen anywhere in the U.S., including our own schools. The recent shooting has proven that all the safety measures we put in place still could not stop a shooter. The shooter in Uvalde wasn't legally allowed to buy beer, but he could purchase firearms. We have reached a point where common-sense gun laws should be put in place.

This is a workplace issue. This is a union issue. This is a school issue. Teachers deserve safe workplaces without fear of a mass shooting, and our students deserve to learn and thrive in safe schools. Please remember this on election day!

SPED Paperwork = Too Much Work in Too Little Time

The secondary SPED delivery model is shifting services away from para supported classes to a more direct instruction from SPED teachers. Because of this change, SPED case managers were directed to accomplish hours of due process paperwork under an unreasonable timeline. The workload is unmanageable and is a blatant disregard of the time it would take from case managers' personal time in the evenings. Marta Biegler and Val Holthus spoke at the School Board meeting Monday night and distributed a copy of the unreasonable expectations placed on SPED case managers, and provided a solution: District SPED Leadership need to respect their teachers by sending out a letter to all SPED parents advising them a change would be coming, and allow the case managers to complete their IEPs as they become due, unless the parents object in writing.

Legislative Updates

<u>Candidate Screenings:</u> Ever wanted to actually know who you are voting for? This is easy and you can do it from your back patio on Zoom. We have 2 dates coming up on the calendar for candidate screenings: **Thursday**, **6/16**, **1-4:30** and **Tuesday**, **6/21**, **1-4:30**. It's likely to be shorter than this time frame, but allows for flexibility with scheduling. Please join me to help interview candidates and deciding who AHEM is going to support this year!

Pledge to Vote: This week at our AHEM Recognition Dinner, President Holthus challenged us to imagine a state where the Governor, Senate, and House were all controlled by conservative, anti-public education supporters. There is a real threat

of this happening this year. As in our neighboring states, our rights to bargain for wages and working conditions would dry up overnight. When this happened in Wisconsin, teachers lost an average \$10,000 in wages in 2 years. 2 things to help: 1) Show up at the polls in November. 2) Sign up to be a Worksite Action Leader. Help your building rep with 2 Get Out the Vote events in the fall. We're offering you \$150 for your time and energy this time around. Please talk with your rep to make a difference!

MN Legislative Session: Gov. Tim Walz stated Wednesday that there are "reasons to be optimistic" that legislators could reach agreements on unfinished tax and spending bills but that they may need to "shrink it down a bit." After meeting with legislative leadership, they agreed to wait until after the Memorial Day weekend before pushing ahead.
