Collective Bargaining Q & A

We are in the thick of contract negotiations, which in a union is called *collective* bargaining.

What, exactly, is collective bargaining? Collective Bargaining is a process through which the union, as a collective of their membership, and the employer exchange proposals and reach a written agreement.

When does bargaining start? Usually bargaining occurs when your contract is about to expire. Ours expired on June 30th, 2023.

Who is on the bargaining team? Our negotiators are selected by an

interview process with members and union officers serving on the interview team. The District chooses who will represent the management side. All bargaining sessions are open for our members to attend. The next bargaining session is on Wednesday, October 4th at the union office starting at 8:30 a.m.

How does the negotiations team know what to bargain for? This year the AHEM team took input from hundreds of its members from a variety of instructional areas through surveys, meetings and other gatherings. They also held community meetings to learn what the community finds most important in order to formulate proposals. This year the state legislature also had several bills that affected contract negotiations, and these needed to be examined, which takes time.

How are negotiations conducted? Negotiations is a long process, which can be extended by the number of proposals brought to the table by both sides. At this moment, the AHEM team has brought 34 language proposals, which four have been agreed upon. Language items are negotiated before the costs of pay and benefits are examined.

Does the District bring language items too? Yes, this week the District brought forward several language items. One we accepted willingly, several required some research, and one would require more work from our members with no additional pay, so the negotiations team not only has to present items to make your work environment better, they must also stave off items brought by the District that would ultimately make your job more difficult.

What if an agreement cannot be reached? The parties can use mediation, arbitration, and/or AHEM can withhold their work (strike) until an agreement can be made. Striking is a rare, last resort.

What happens when both sides finally agree? When the teams reach a tentative agreement, both sides take the agreement to their groups for review. AHEM members will vote on whether they accept or reject the agreement. Only members can vote. Non-members do not have a voice. If the agreement receives a majority of the vote, a new working agreement has been produced. If the vote fails, the teams continue to meet.

What will happen if a part of the contract needs revision later? A labor management team made up of union and district representatives will meet, and possibly write and agree on a memorandum of understanding (MOU) which should resolve the issue.

Description of Complete 1 - 4 Series

This series is designed to deepen educators' understanding of their own frames of reference, the potential bias in these frames, and their impact on expectations for and relationships with students, students' families, and the school communities. Participants will engage in self-reflection and discussion around the following topics: racial, cultural, and socioeconomic groups; American Indian and Alaskan native students; religion; systemic racism; gender identity, including transgender students; sexual orientation; language diversity; and individuals with disabilities and mental health concerns.

Module #1: Expanding Your Equity Lens (2 1/2 hours)

Equity work is a journey, and in this session, we will lay the foundation for centering equity work in your community. Participants will ground themselves with norms and vocabulary and develop and understanding of the importance of intercultural competency.

Potential MN Special Session: Governor Walz sat down with several police organizations Wednesday night to discuss the School Resource Officer (SRO) issue. The Attorney General's office and Governor Walz have both said that SRO's can continue to use force in schools during life-threatening situations, and that nothing has really changed. However, many police organizations have not seen it the same way.

There is potential to make progress on this issue now since the sides are speaking directly.
